Response to: Hitchcock Films

Research the term *voyeurism* (and any other paraphilias that you think might apply) and then apply to an analysis/comparison of Jeffries (*Rear Window*) & Scottie (*Vertigo*). For example, both men chose careers that require them to observe others (photojournalist/detective)--from a distance--yet both men become involved and then themselves become part of the story. Are other lines blurred--ethical lines, social mores, etc.?

You could also analyze the characters from a cinematography/visual perspective. For instance, how does Hitchcock film the characters to *visually* emphasize their *emotional* separation from others/society? Does the director use any other filmmaking techniques to characterize Jeffries or Scottie?

Research the term *necrophilia* (and any other paraphilias that you think might apply) and then apply to an analysis/comparison of the speaker in "The Leper" and Emily in "A Rose for Emily." What do you know about each character (speaker/Emily) that makes necrophilia a likely interpretation of/explanation for the characters' behavior in the stories? Characterize each characters' (speaker/Emily) relationship with the object of their affection/obsession (the leper/Homer Barron).
